BOLOGNA, A GUIDE



Bologna is one of the most overlooked cities in Italy, and the Bolognese are happy to keep it that way. As you stroll by terracotta-colored buildings, walk down cobblestone streets, and then glance up to see “le due torri” (the two towers) in the background, you will know you are in a special place.

Bologna has a wealth of museums, cathedrals, and sights that will fill your time here with ancient Italian culture. Bologna is also world-famous for its food and offers some of the most “squisiti piatti” (delicious dishes) in Italy.

Piazza Maggiore

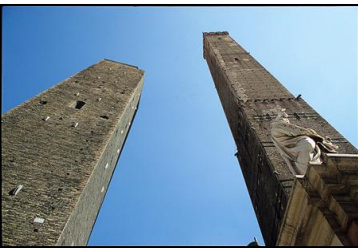
Piazza Maggiore can be considered not only the center, but also the heart of Bologna. It is lined with majestic buildings in the Romanesque and Gothic style with palazzos, a basilica, an art gallery and a beautiful fountain. The buildings, which form a major part of this medieval square, were built between 1200 and 1400 A.D. One of the most beautiful symbols of this square is the Fontana del Nettuno (Neptune Fountain). Dedicated to the sea god Neptune, it is the work of Giambologna, completed between 1564 and 1566.



San Petronio

Piazza Maggiore

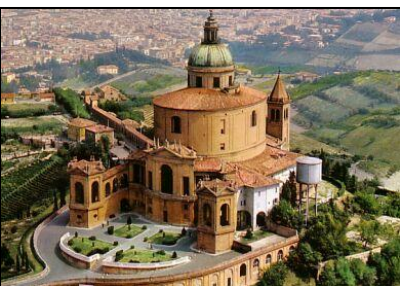
This is the main church of Bologna. Interesting features include: a solar calendar on the east (left) side of the floor – when the sun shines in the oculus at the top of the church around midday, it lands on whatever day it is. In the early 1500s, by order of the Pope, Michelangelo lived and worked right behind San Petronio.



Le Due Torri

Piazza della Porta Ravegnana (walk all the way down San Vitale until it ends)

The towers Garisenda and Asinelli, built in the early 12th century, are two of the few towers still standing from at least 180 built during that time. Enjoy them from the outside, and if you feel like getting some cardiovascular exercise, take a hike up Asinelli's nearly 500 steps to enjoy a beautiful view of the city. Asinelli, 3 €. Open daily 9:00 to 18:00.



Santuario della Madonna di San Luca

Climbing to San Luca is only partially about the church; the walk itself winds you through the longest continuous portico in the world, 3.5 km long, consisting of 666 arches, where you can see beautiful views of the Bolognese countryside from the top. Start your tour by heading to the southwest of the city, starting at Porta Saragozza and heading out of the city on via Saragozza. Stay on the right side of the sidewalk, and eventually you will be led up some steps to cross the street. Then follow the portico all the way up! At the top, there's also a great pizzeria, which tastes even better after the long walk! If you don't feel like walking all the way you can also take bus #20 from the stop in front of Palazzo Re Enzo and Piazza Nettuno towards "Casalecchio Centro", and get off at stop "Meloncello" to start right at the bottom of the big hill.



Chiesa di Santo Stefano

Piazza Santo Stefano

Chiesa di Santo Stefano is not just one church, but a collection of seven churches/temples, built on top of one another, dating all the way from the first century C.E. (AD) to the end of the 16th century; beautiful courtyards and old treasures.



Museo Civico Medievale

Via Manzoni, 4

The Museum contains exhibits from all around the world including numerous pieces of Pre-Colombian, Asiatic, and African art, other collections containing oriental arms, gold Lombard crosses, byzantine ivories, Murano glass, ceramics from Faenza, Turkish arquebuses, and many other items which represent the evolution of Medieval and Bolognese Renaissance art.



MAMbo (Museo d'Arte Moderna di Bologna)

Via Don Minzoni, 14

This massive modern art museum, more familiarly known as Mambo, opened in May 2007 near the Manifattura delle Arti arts complex in a former bread factory. The stone structure, with arched windows, soaring ceilings and exposed iron trusses, is already being called the Italian equivalent of the Tate Modern in London.

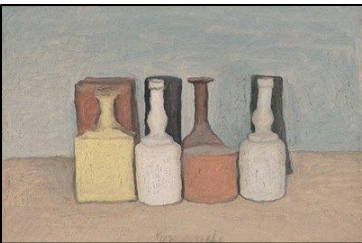


Museo Internazionale e Biblioteca della Musica di Bologna

This museum displays the exam on which Mozart potentially cheated to get into Bologna's music conservatory when he was a teenager, as well as some rare musical instruments. The museum often has free concerts and other events; just check the website, or walk in and ask.



Museo Morandi

Inside Palazzo d'Accursio, Piazza Maggiore, 6 (if you're facing San Petronio in Piazza Maggiore, it's the big palace on your right)

The early 20th century Italian painter Giorgio Morandi lived and worked in Bologna for nearly all of his life, and this museum houses a comprehensive collection of his work, including some rare etchings.



Biblioteca Salaborsa

Piazza Nettuno, 3

Walk into the front of the library, go past the desk and you walk into what used to be the Bolognese stock exchange in the late 19th century (sala borsa = literally "purse room"). Look up first and check out all of the frescoes, painting and architecture. Now, look down, down, through the floor. What you see through the glass are the remains of the Roman forum of Bologna dating back to the 7th century B.C.E. (Closed Sunday)

DAY TRIPS NEAR BOLOGNA

Ferrara



The **Duomo San Romano** is an unbelievable site from afar, with a triple façade sculpted in the 12th century (Free, Open 7:30-12:00 and 15:00-18:30 daily, Piazza Cattedrale). Also, take a walk through the **Castello Estense** (7 €, open Tues-Sun 9:30 – 16:45; you can walk through the courtyard free), a moated castle, which houses the tourist information office. As in many Italian cities, as you walk around Ferrara keep your eyes open for beautiful courtyards. Tourist Office, Castello Estense - Head straight out of the station down via Arturo Cassoli and just keep on that street for a while and wander a couple of blocks to your left (<http://www.artecultura.fe.it/index.phtml?id=312>); Ferrara is only a 30 minute train ride (8 € round-trip) from Bologna.

Ravenna



Ravenna has some of the most incredible and beautiful mosaics in the world (<http://www.ravennamosaici.it/>). This is MUST SEE while you're in Emilia-Romagna. The ceiling of the **Basilica San Vitale** is literally covered by these little pieces of colored tile, as is the entire interior of the **Mausoleo di Galla Placidia** a small structure right behind it (via San Vitale 17). Look for the random hands and feet on the mosaic columns and curtains on one wall of the **Basilica di Sant'Apollinare Nuovo**, as some mosaics of people were removed during the Iconoclasm (corner of Via di Roma & Via G. Carducci). For additional mosaics, take bus 4 or 44 from the train station to **Basilica di Sant'Apollinare in Classe** (3€). Also, stop by **Dante's Tomb** (via Dante Aligheri), and although there's not much to see, you could still read some of *La Divina Commedia* over this Italian poet's final resting place. Individual tickets are not available for 5 of Ravenna's sites, but the **Ravenna Card** (Biglietto Unico) covers them all: the Basilica di San Vitale, Basilica di Sant'Apollinare Nuovo, Battistero Neoniano, Mausoleo di Gallo Placidia, and Museo Arcivescovile is 8.50 €. You can buy the card at any of those sights. Ravenna is about 1½ hours via train from Bologna. Tourist Office - Via Salara 8, walk straight out of the train station down Viale Farini, and at the end of Piazza del Popolo, take a right and follow the signs. <http://www.turismo.ravenna.it/index.php?lang=2>

Verona



Although perhaps most famous as the setting for Shakespeare's love story, there is much more to Verona than the much abused statue of Juliet. There's a **Roman Arena** from the first century AD in the middle of Verona (Piazza Brà). The crumbling **Teatro Romano** offers great views of the city from across the river (via Regaste Redentore 2). **Piazza Erbe** and **Piazza dei Signori** are fun markets to walk through, although they can sometimes be crowded with tourists. Verona is about a 1½ hour train ride from Bologna. Tourist Offices – one at the train station, and another at V. degli Alpini 9, around the corner from the Arena. <http://www.tourism.verona.it/>



Parma



Yes, this is the town from which the famous Parmigiano Reggiano got its name, although it is perhaps more famous in Italy for its prosciutto crudo. But this town has much more than food. Only about an hour away by train, Parma is worth checking out for a walk around the beautiful old center of town and to see some architecture. Make sure to stop by the **Teatro Regio**, where they used to hold fake naval battles, and fill the area where the stage is with water (Via Garibaldi 16, near Piazza della Pace, 1 € students, Open M-Sat 10:30-12:00). The **Battistero** is reminiscent of the one in Florence, except without the throngs of tourists, and you can actually go inside and see some of the treasures (5 € Open 9:00-12:30 and 15:00-18:30 daily). The **Duomo** right next door houses some beautiful frescoes, including some by the Renaissance painter, Correggio (Free, Open 9:00-12:30, 15:00-19:00 daily, both the Battistero and the Duomo are on Piazza del Duomo). Tourist Office - Via Melloni, 1/a - When exiting the train station, follow via Verdi, the street straight ahead on the left, all the way down through the arches to the Piazza della Pace. Once you hit Piazza della Pace, take your first left and it will be a

couple of doors down. <http://turismo.comune.parma.it/>

Also, don't forget that Bologna is one of Italy's main train hubs, and trains direct to Venice (2hrs), Milan (2hrs), Florence (1hr), and Rome (3hrs) depart many times each day!

LUOGHI PER MANGIARE! (PLACES TO EAT!) [Google Map](#)



Known as “la grossa” (the fat) because of its gastronomic delights, Bologna has become a must-eat destination for foodies from around the world. In that respect, there is no shortage of delicious restaurants, osterias, pizzerias, and gelaterias. Bologna’s role as a major center of academic and student culture allows for relatively inexpensive food, especially compared to other popular tourist destinations in Italy like Venice and Rome. A traditional pizza margherita (tomato sauce, mozzarella, and basil) from a take-away restaurant will cost about 3.50 Euros. Keep in mind that you cannot get take-out everywhere. Look for “da asporto” (to take away), or ask before you order, “Potrei portare via?” (Can I take away?). Also, you usually can’t take home leftovers, so eat up!

Local dishes to try

Tortellini in Brodo (meat-filled tortellini in broth); Mortadella (a large Italian sausage or cold cut made of finely hashed/ground heat-cured pork sausage); Pasta Bolognese (butter/cream based meat sauce); *Vegetarian Friendly (always ask to make sure it doesn’t have meat)*: Piadina (between a wrap and a panino); fresh pasta (specifically tortellini & tortelloni)



Notes on business hours: Most restaurants, osterias, and even take-away pizza places are open for both lunch (11:00-14:00 or 15:00) and dinner (18:00-23:00), but few if any stay open during the afternoon. Many close for one day a week, usually Sunday or Monday. Bars (i.e. cafes) are open from 7:00 or 8:00 until 18:00 or 19:00, and some stay open later depending on the location. Nearly all bars are closed on Sundays. Gelaterias are usually open from around lunchtime until 22:00. Some gelaterias close once a week; again usually on Sunday or Monday.

Gelato tip: With gelato, you can almost always get “due gusti” (2 flavors) even if you get the smallest size, so definitely try out different delicious combinations!
